Rafts To Be Launched In Race July 24 From Deep River Landing

DEEP RIVER — The place to be this Saturday, July 24, at 10:30 a.m. is unquestionably the Deep River Town Landing, for it is from this site that the 2nd annual Connecticut River Raft Race will be launched.

This year some twenty entries have been received, some with crews as small as 3 or 4, others with crews as large as 15. Last year's winner, Wet Dream, is re-entering with a new vessel, Wet Dream II, and a crew of 50.

The rafts themselves must be of homemade construction and their dimensions may not exceed 36 ft. in length or 12 ft. in width and may not be less than 8 ft. in length or 4 ft. in width. Self-propelling implements of all kinds are permitted, but no motors.

The regulation spells out what types of property are considered public — "any place to which the general public has access and has a right to resort for business, entertainment, or other lawful purpose, and shall also include the front or immediate area of any store, shop, restaurant, tavern or other place of business and also public grounds, areas or parks."

Questions are bound to arise as the law is enforced. It is important that residents cooperate with the town to increase the efficiency of the law enforcers' task.
